ITEM #	ITEM	DESCRIPTION AND ACTION ITEMS
1	Call to Order	The meeting was called to order by Mr. Christopher R. Owens, KCRTF Co-Chair designate, at 12:30pm.
		Mr. Owens asked all attendees to stand and share in a moment of silent reflection in support of District Attorney Ken Thompson, who has announced that he has cancer and who will not be performing his regular functions as District Attorney until he has completed his recovery. There was a moment of silence.
		Mr. Owens asked all attendees to sign-in so that attendance records will be accurate and asked everyone to sign-in legibly to ensure that their contact information is accurate.
		KCRTF Co-Chair Audrey Thompson was introduced.
2	Opening remarks	Co-Chair, Ms. Audrey Thompson, representing NYS DOCCS, presented the Agenda for August 3, 2016.
		Ms. Thompson also presented a few introductory remarks regarding DOCCS' ongoing work in the area of employment development.
3	Introductions	Those in attendance introduced themselves, their organizations (if applicable), and their interest in the KCRTF.
		Dr. Seward introduced DCJS Deputy Commissioner Robert Maccarone and asked him to speak.
		Remarks by Commissioner Robert Maccarone:
		Robert Maccarone ("RM") expressed his appreciation for the gathering and each of the participants in the meeting. He acknowledged Margaret Chretien as someone who advocates for the KCRTF within DCJS. She also compiles "Re-Entry Today." RM saluted leadership of DA Thompson, Mr. Owens, Ms. Thompson and Dr. Seward. He expressed his best wishes for the DA.
		When RM took office in 2011, 18 CRTFs were serving a collective total of 1500 individuals. Currently, 19 CRTFs with 20 th hopefully on the way (Queens) and there is strong support from Governor Andrew Cuomo through the Governor's Council on Re-Entry and Reintegration, led by the Governor's Counsel, Alphonso David, and Secretary of State Rosanna Rosado. "Banning the Box" on SUNY applications is critical because education has been and remains "the path out." New announcements are forthcoming. RM acknowledged CBOs and advocacy groups that made the "Banning The Box" change possible, particularly CCA.
		Current metrics are as follows: As of 10/16, the 19 CRTFs are serving 5,100 individuals – moderate to high-risk individuals and special populations are all being served. He anticipates another 1,000 to be served with the next \$1M in funding. Announcements are imminent.
		Program Model. Changes this past July included metrics for CBI participation – Thinking 4 Change and RSW! (Ready Set Work!) – itself a three-week, 180-hour training. We have to address primary service needs, including stable housing, clothing, food, because it's difficult for a person to focus on changing behavior if s/he doesn't know when s/he is going to eat or where s/he will be sleeping. RM referenced the Maslow Triangle – primary needs come first, such as substance abuse treatment, addressing mental illness challenges, veterans' challenges, etc., before someone gets to the stage of "pre-contemplation" regarding their choices and decisions. We can address all of these needs, however, but if we don't change a person's thinking, we might not change their behavior. A more concerted effort has existed to increase the CBI numbers – through program reimbursements.
		Relationship with NYSDOCCS has greatly improved over time. Requiring DOCCS to be a co-chair of each CRTF was an excellent decision and has been very helpful. DOCCS has already been interested in working on the CRTF initiatives, but the state-agency structure matches up awkwardly with county-based administration of criminal justice services. The "partnerships" have done well. DCJS position with DOCCS is "if it is not working for you, it is not working for us" and DCJS will make the changes

		necessary to ensure that CRTFs are of value to DOCCS.
		The KCRTF is a strong example of the positive outcomes. RM is considering recommending the KCRTF as a pilot training site for New York State, and have the other CRTFs come to KCRTF meetings to understand what is taking place within the KCRTF and how to possibly replicate it.
		Series of hub meetings have been taking place in Albany to build on the commitment to positive re-entry goals. Work is being done to clearly define the "re-entry" concept as a process from the moment an individual enters incarceration through their tenure and beyond; what are the steps that must occur to ensure a smooth transition to the community.
		"I congratulate you. I salute you. You are doing God's work. What could be more important in life than helping individuals change their lives? There's nothing more important."
4	Presentation of meeting minutes: August 3, 2016	Dr. Seward requested that attendees review the Minutes from the August 3, 2016 KCRTF Bi-Monthly Meeting, and contact the Task Force if there were any comments or concerns that required corrections.
5	Coordinator's	Dr. Seward presented the Coordinator's Report.
	Report	Completed 90-day mid-contract-year period from July 1 through September 30 prior to the next contract. It is being labeled the 16X period and stats will be reported in December.
		Clients are now more savvy than before. They are more selective regarding their desires, programs and outcomes. Credit goes to preparation "on the inside" that allows them to think critically about their choices on the outside. Transformation is a challenge to some degree, due to these changed dynamics. The KCRTF is committed to assisting every client with finding the right programs for their needs, and new clients need to understand this.
		On 9/26, the proposal for the new DCJS contract was submitted. The proposal requested additional funds for an additional Case Manager and an obligation to serve a minimum of 300 clients, rather than the current 250. The KCRTF network and DOCCS collaborations will enable the KCRTF to reach a higher goal.
		Clients are coming with many different needs that should be addressed as much and as soon as possible, preferably within the initial 90-day period. No longer a "three-legged stool" of housing, employment and treatment – there is now a "bench." Power from the Pastors in the room is needed to ensure that we get the additional funds and case manager.
		[Mr. Boone noted that he has been meeting more formerly-incarcerated men through the young people involved with his program and it has been rewarding.]
		CBI REPORT
		Cohort 4 of Thinking For Change (T4C) has been operating. Dr. Seward identified a consultant, Mr. Jefferson, who is working with the KCRTF staff (Andrea Johnson) on T4C sessions. T4C sessions take place on Tuesday mornings on-site at DOCCS Brooklyn Regional office, with the assistance of Ms. Thompson, Michelle' Yon and Ms. Hall. Majority of participants are younger, have not been in prison for a long time but have recidivism challenges.
		Selection of T4C participants by DOCCS has advantages as a client then gets to address multiple needs during his/her visit to DOCCS for the session, including the regular report day, and assigned participants are more likely to attend (no reasons to not attend) and have fewer incidents. In some cases, T4C participation allows some clients to complete their anger management requirements. Good behavior / compliance can lead to reduced supervision requirements by DOCCS, which is not announced in advance. Mr. Jefferson, who is formerly incarcerated, is an asset as a group leader through role modeling – you, too, can get your act together, it's never too old to change, and DOCCS staff gets a

different perspective on folks coming out as they get to work with a success story regularly. RSW! is offered in collaboraton with NYS Education Department's ACCESS-VR. The goal is to have more groups more often to ensure adequate enrollment and attendance at sessions (less than 5 participants is a problem). RSW! should be provided after T4C, not before. **COMMITTEE UPDATES** Case Conference Committee. Changes will be taking place. Ms. Yon will now be the primary DOCCS representative participating in the KCRTF/DOCCS case conferences. **Public Education Committee.** REPHIDIM/FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH OF CROWN HEIGHTS - Focusing on families of the incarcerated and the formerly incarcerated to assist with making change and increasing comfort. Rev. Odom spoke. First meeting included testimony from a son who had been away for decades and whose mother stood by him and maintained contact. Other topics were addressed. Next meeting is Thursday, October 6th. Goal is to minimize shame and stigma and tear down barriers. Dr. Seward expanded on the topics and congratulated Rev. Odom and Rev. Bloodsaw for launching the project and getting people to open up. WEBSITE - Dr. Seward introduced Mr. Owens as the presenter. Remarks by Christopher Owens: Mr. Owens stated that, in May, 2014, two months after he had started with the DA's office, the KCRTF was a small gathering of some 15 people. The participation has expanded tremendously since then. Owens stated that his role has been more technical – trying to get things to run better and communicating better with all of the re-entry stakeholders. A web presence is a critical component to serving as the "hub" for servicing formerly-incarcerated individuals and their families. Owens stated that competition between organizations for "clients" is pointless as the need exceeds the capacity of the organizations. "There's plenty to go around. Let us be your hub." Mr. Owens then reviewed the web pages within the <u>www.brooklynda.org</u> website and the information contained thereon. First page presents contact information for the KCRTF and an explanation of what the 0 KCRTF is and its basic process. http://www.brooklynda.org/reentry/ Second page presents the KCRTF participants and their attendance at meetings, in 0 addition to links to organizational websites. http://www.brooklynda.org/reentry-taskforce-participants/ Third page presents meetings and events as well as KCRTF meetings. Restrictions as to how information should be used publicly can be communicated to us.

Applicable. e were no reports or concerns raised. Seward introduced the guest presentations with the theme "Everything is Re-Entry" – a holistic bach is needed to re-entry.
